Employment estimates in this report are generated by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS). Monthly employment estimates are subject to revision in subsequent months when more sample data become available. BLS data in this report are rounded to the nearest 100.

On a seasonally adjusted basis, preliminary estimates from the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) indicate nonfarm employment in Washington rose by 2,900 in August 2023.1 BLS estimates the private sector gained 2,700 jobs during the month and the public sector gained 200 jobs.

On a not seasonally adjusted basis, estimates for August 2022 through August 2023 indicate an increase in employment of 55,200 for the state. The private sector gained 46,600 jobs while the public sector gained an estimated 8,600 jobs over the year.

Washington's preliminary seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for August 2023 is 3.6 percent. The revised estimated July 2023 unemployment rate is at 3.6 percent. The August 2022 unemployment rate was 4.3 percent.

BLS estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. Preliminary estimates are subject to revision. The July 2023 preliminary estimated loss of 6,400 jobs was revised to a loss of 6,300 jobs.

The resident civilian labor force is the total number of people in the workforce, employed and unemployed, ages 16 and up.

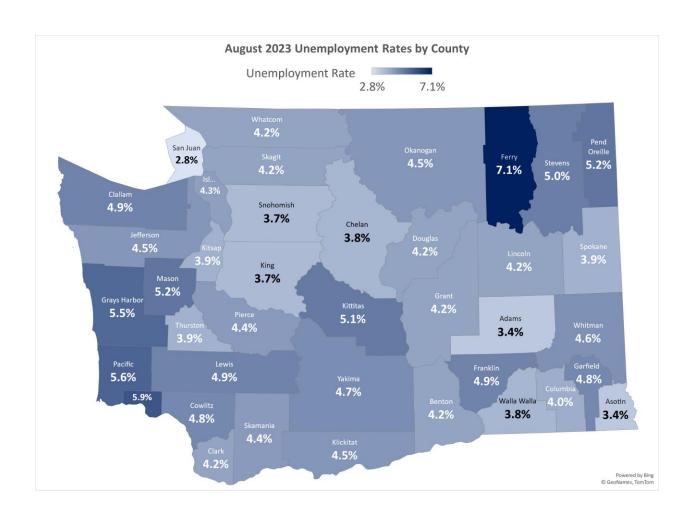
The number of unemployed is the estimated number of people who currently do not have a job, are available for work and have actively looked for work in the last four weeks.

The unemployment rate is the ratio of the estimated number of unemployed divided by the civilian labor force.

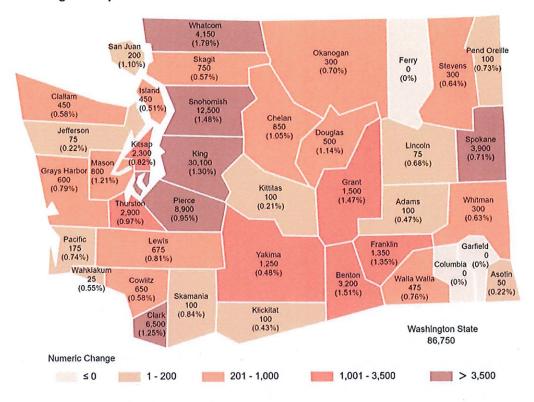

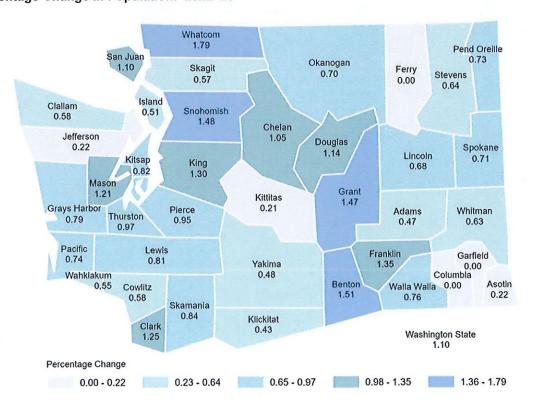

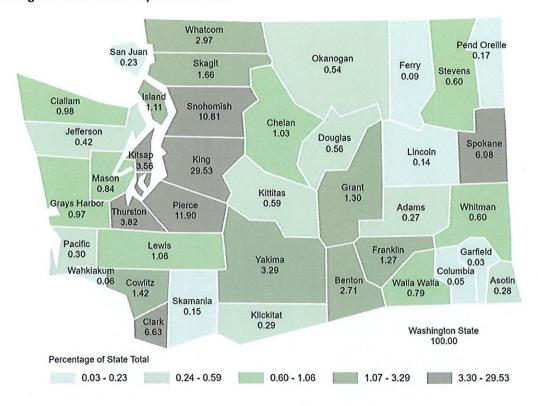
Numeric Change in Population: 2022-23



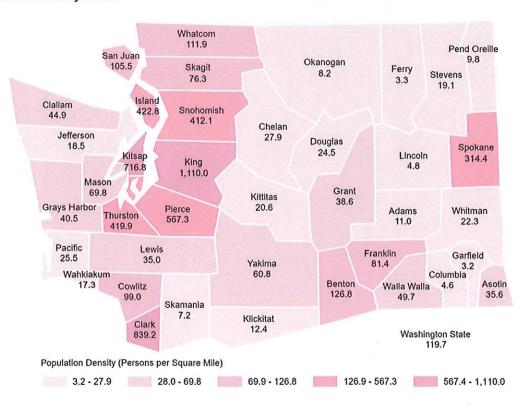
Percentage Change in Population: 2022-23

This is an EU FDI company who is actively seeking support to locate sites, with a preference to brownfields sites that they can lease. The company would like to locate in proximity to biomanufacturing/pharmaceutical industries and to a highway and airport.

The company is seeking proposals and supporting information for their review. The RFI is for a response with property information and the completion of the company's data request, with information requested on HR costs, real estate, and regional company information, including the number of cell-meat companies and in the BioTech sector.
