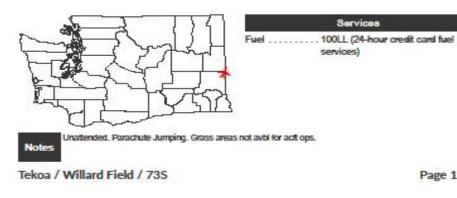

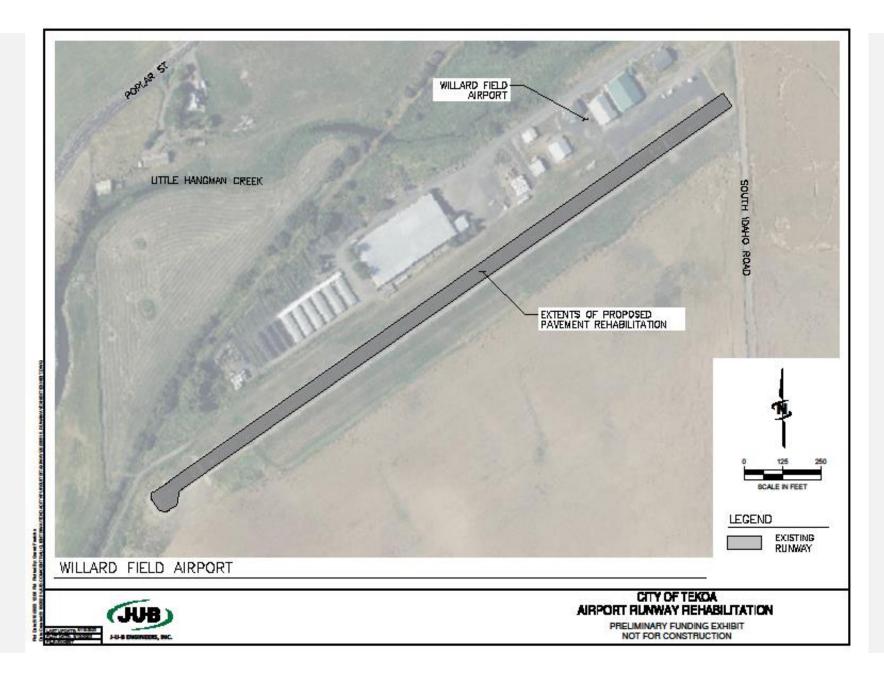

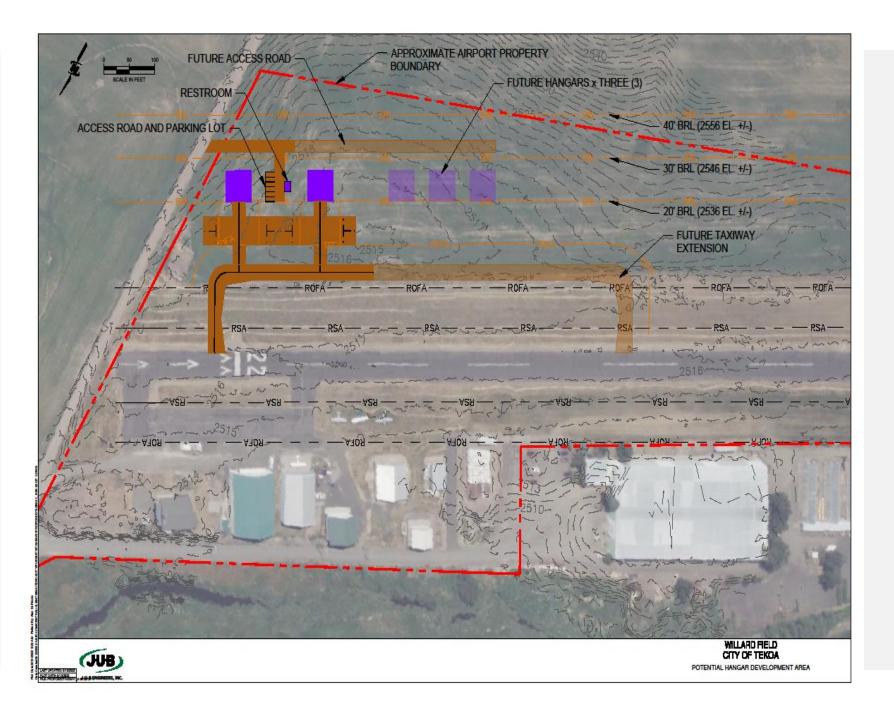

Any Good News in the Data?

Some positive trends:

- Significant drop in the poverty rate in the county: 32% in 2015 down to 24.7% (<18% adjusting for WSU population)
- Food insecurity rate is down from ~20% in 2016 to ~12% now
- Vacancy rates are higher, rent prices may start flattening

Flip that coin:

- Homelessness trending up, especially doubling up and living in cars
- After adjusting Poverty Rate remains double the state's 9%
- Food bank visits at CAC have increased 50% since 2020
- Rents flattening, but shortage of 1 & 2 BR rentals

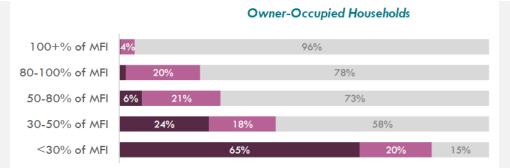

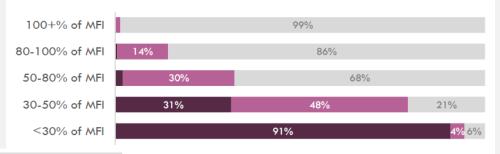

Cost-Burdened Share by Income Level



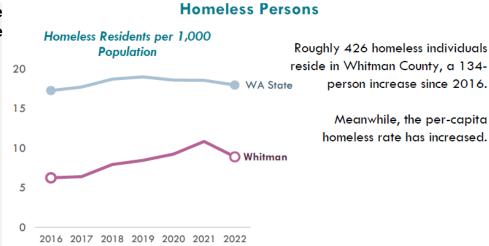

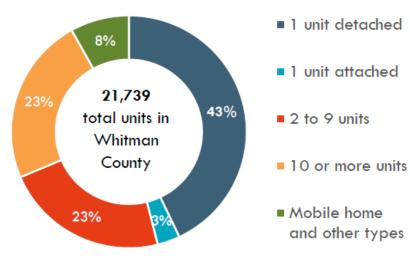

Whitman County Housing Overview

- No surprise, TOP RANKED NEED in 2022 CHNA: "affordable options for places to live"
- Affordable = ___% of available income.
 In 2022, 36% were " cost-burdened" (23% in WA overall)
- 56% of renter households cost-burdened
- More units needed, higher costs to develop/build







Tools at Hand to Help

- Rental assistance:
 - Eviction prevention
 - Housing Choice Vouchers
 - HUD "project-based"
 & LIHTC subsidized housing units
- Housing Development:
 - WA Housing Trust Fund
 - SHB 1406 in Pullman & County





- Challenges to development and rental operations (utilities/labor/insurance)
- Profitability continues to drive multifamily, 3-5 BR units

An Overview of the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy

Overview

- The CEDS is a public/private collaboration to develop a strategy-driven plan for regional economic development.
- SEWEDA is responsible for the preparation and administration of the CEDS for our district.
- Our EDA-designated Economic Development District (EDD) is Asotin, Columbia, Garfield, and Whitman counties.



Purpose



- The purpose of the CEDS is to bring together the public and private sectors to develop a strategic plan to diversify and strengthen the Region's economy.
- Developing a CEDS and earning designation as an EDA Economic Development District makes our region eligible for support from other EDA grant programs.

Guiding Principles



- **Collaboration:** *Embrace the interconnectedness of Southeast Washington and build partnerships across the region.*
- **Resiliency:** *Prioritize policies that prepare the region to avoid, withstand, and recover from economic and environmental disruption.*
- **Inclusivity:** Foster communities that embrace diversity and create and inclusive region.
- **Sustainability:** *Commitment to developing both economic and environmentally resilient communities.*

Project Leadership



Steering Committee

Core group engaged in the planning process. This group is the principal facilitator for economic development planning and implementation, and is responsible for developing, updating, or replacing a strategy.

Advisory Committee

Broader leadership group responsible for developing vision, establishing community priorities, identifying issues, and providing input and feedback on strategies.
