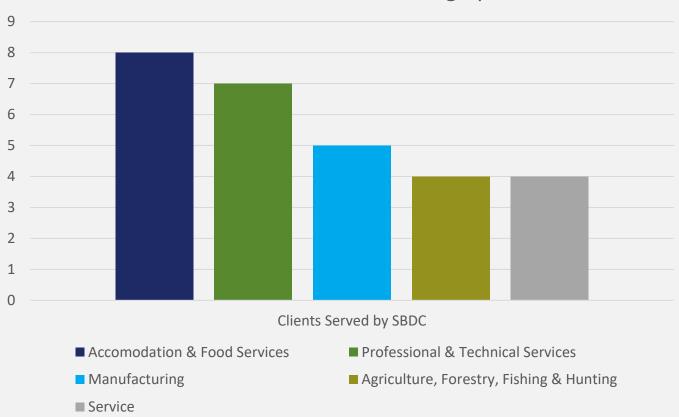

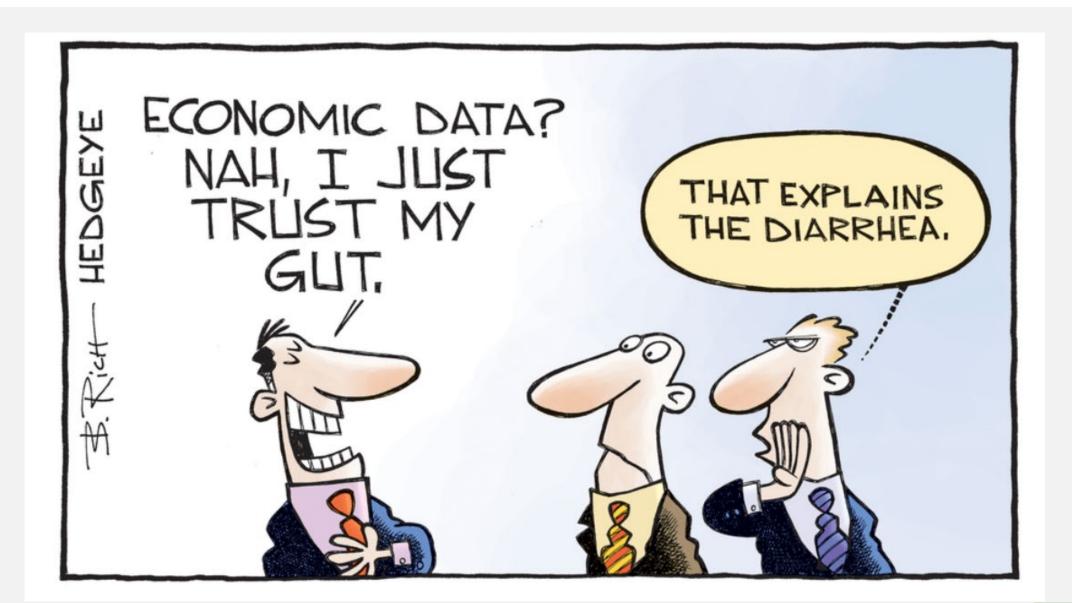

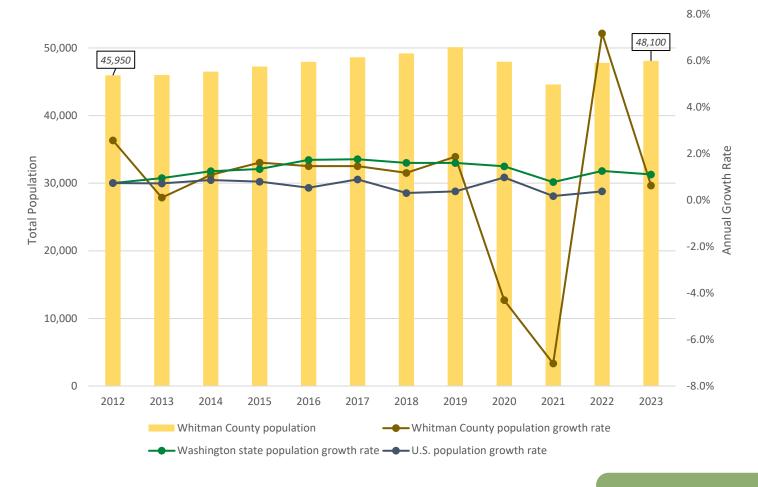

Total Population & Annual Growth Rate

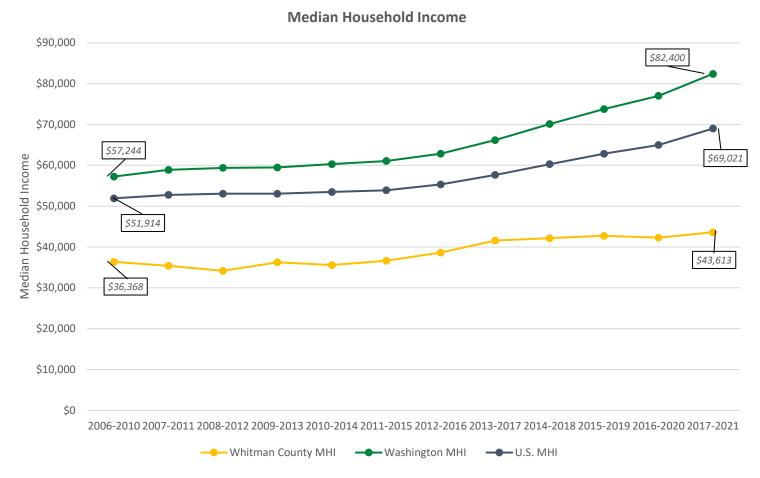
- Students living in WSU dorms ("group quarters") are NOT included in state OFM or U.S. Census population numbers

 dorms in any given year





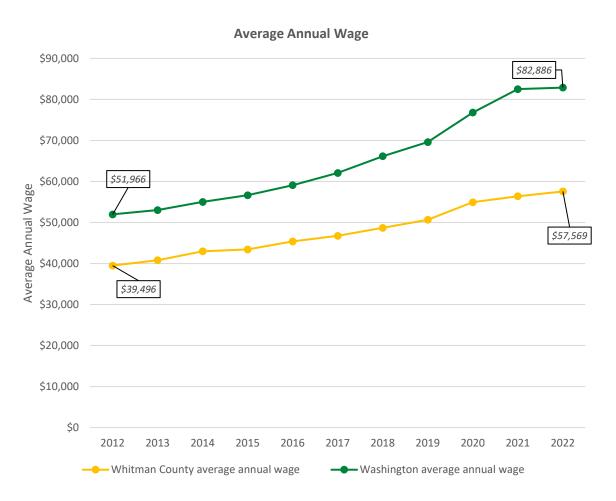
Median Household Income (MHI)

Average Annual Wage

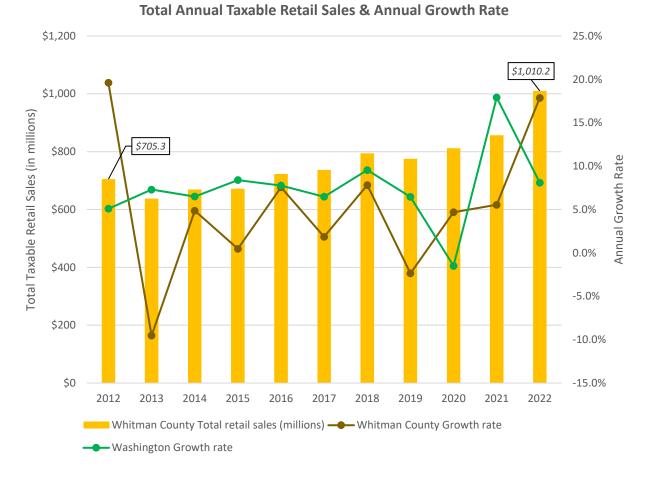
- Measurement of the annual earnings of all workers employed by county firms that pay into the Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund
- Students living in dorms, and people employed part-time, are included
- However, people living in Whitman County but working outside the county are not included

Total Annual Taxable Retail Sales & Annual Growth Rate

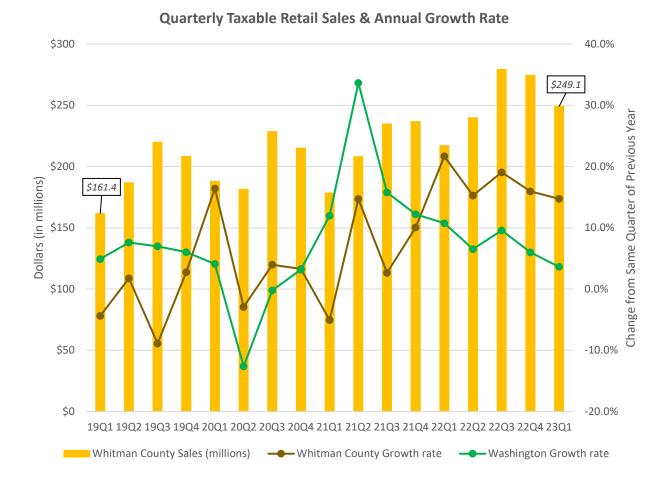
- University construction is included in this number

- Q3 is always highest due to harvest activities and the return of WSU students

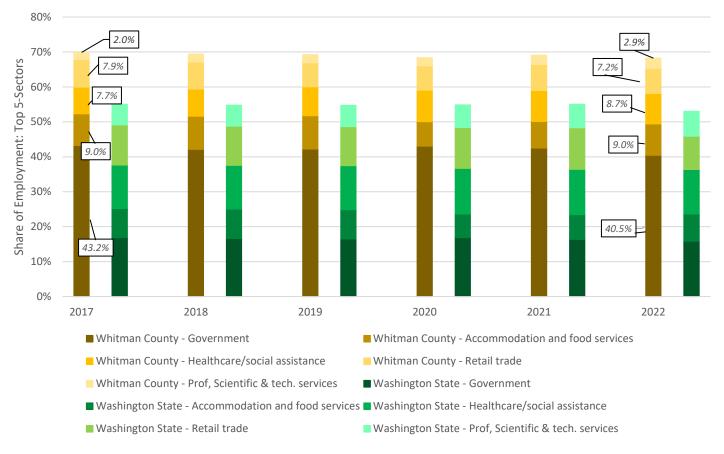

 There is no data on manufacturing because we have fewer than 10 companies and reporting is suppressed

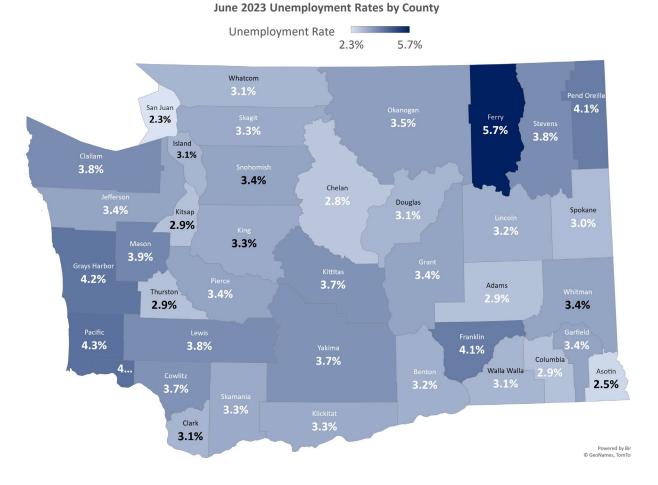
Share of Employment in Top-5 Largest Employing Sectors

Unemployment

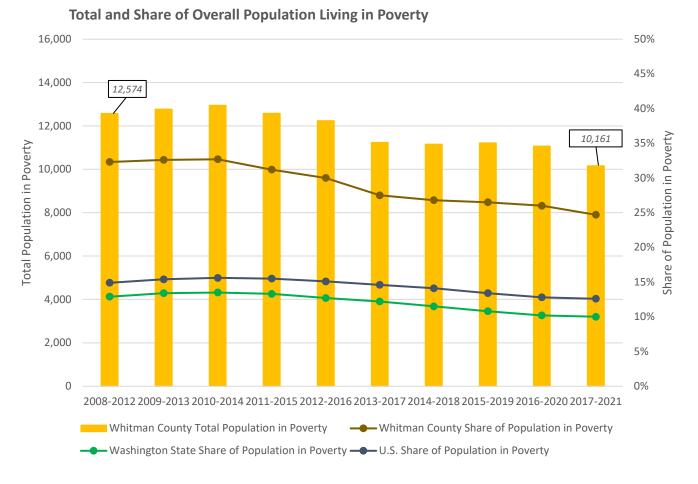
- Whitman County's average unemployment rate for 2022 was 4.8%
- Total number of employed persons for 2022 was 21,453; our high point for the last 10 years was 23,327 people in 2019.

Total and Share of Overall Population Living in Poverty

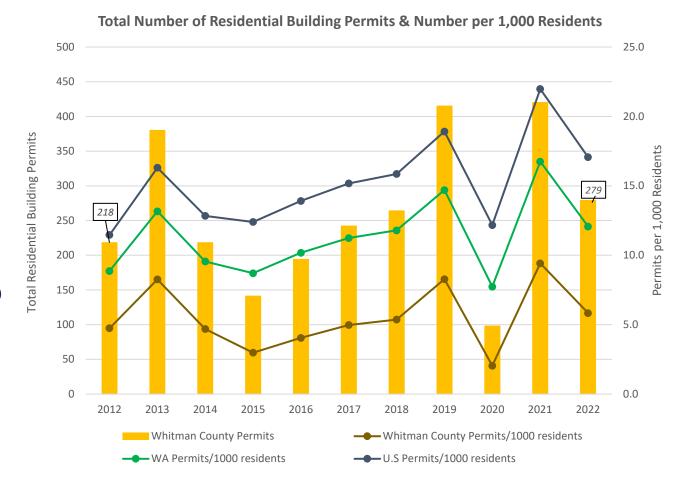
- Whitman was recently designated a Persistent Poverty county – a maintained poverty rate of 20% or more for the last 30 years
- Federal Poverty Levels (FPL) vary by household size and increase by the Consumer Price Index (CPI) every year

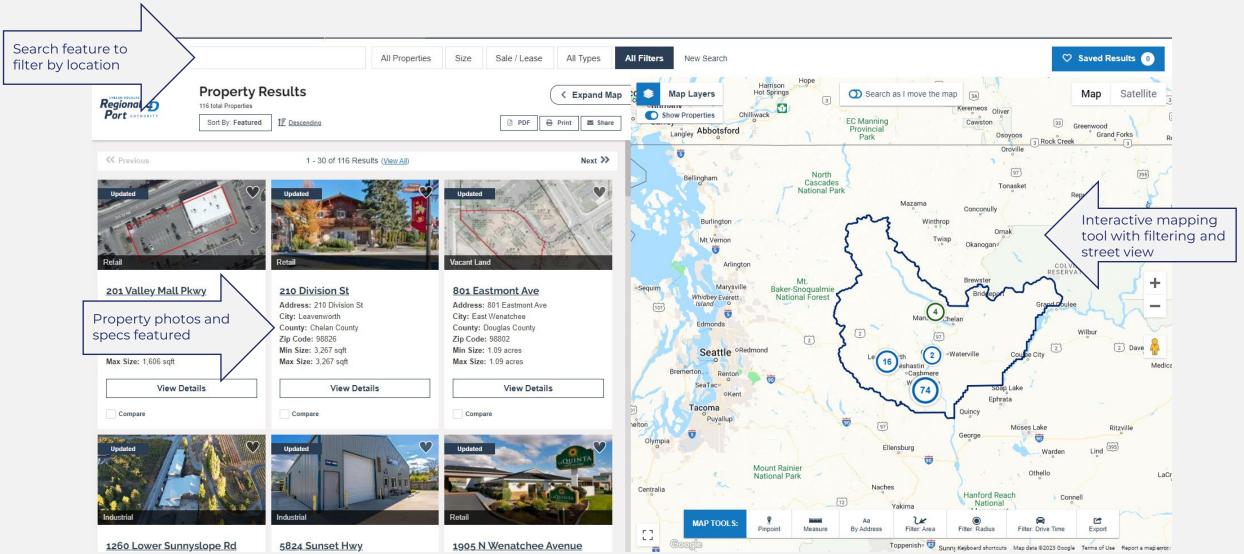
Housing | HAPT Results – Things to Note



Comments about the 2044 projected net new housing demand:

- Whitman is the only county with such a high need (84%) for lowest-income housing (0-30% of area median income). Garfield is second with 77%
- Whitman is 1 of only 4 counties with NO demand for units above 50% of area median income (Columbia=4042 people, Ferry=7273 people, Garfield=2346 people)
- The large concentration of college students in Whitman County contributed to the high number of units needed in the 0-30% non-PSH category, as did the higher overall poverty rate and lower average income (also due to high student population) (per Laura Hodgson)
- Communities addressing housing shortages may want to conduct additional research

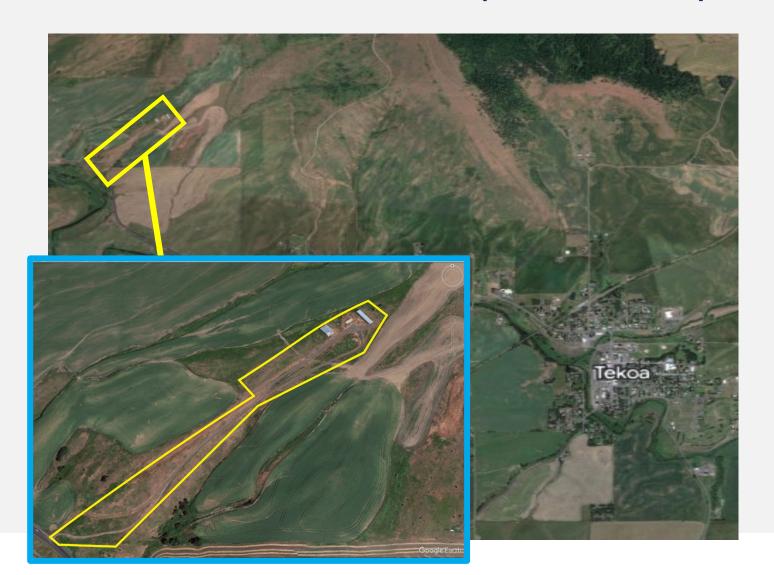
Site & Infrastructure

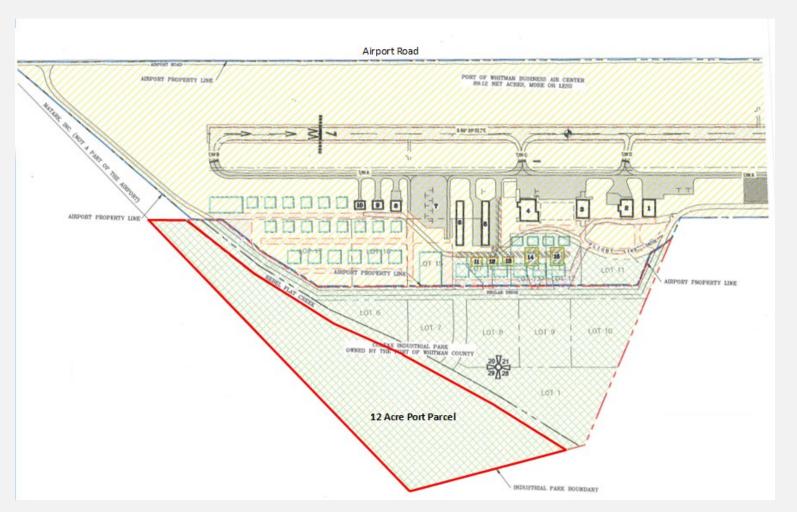




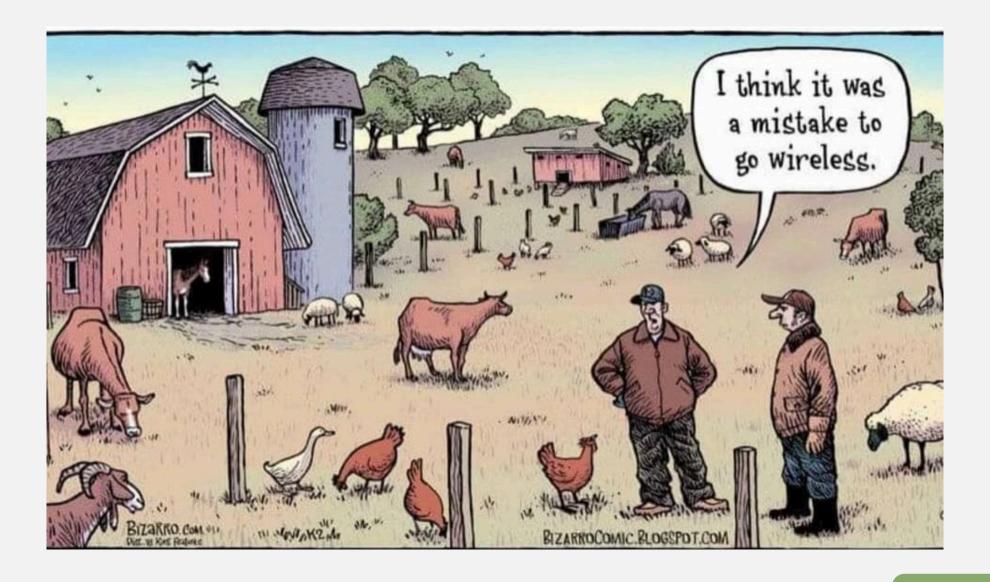
- The Port closed on the 14-acre

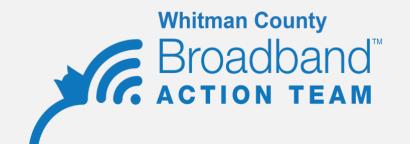
- 12-acre plot southwest of airport

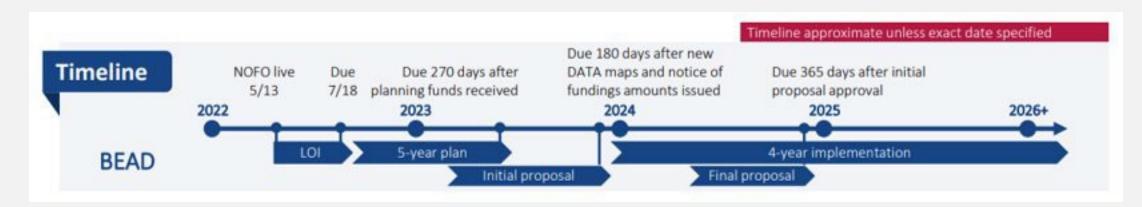

Broadband Equity Access and Deployment (BEAD)

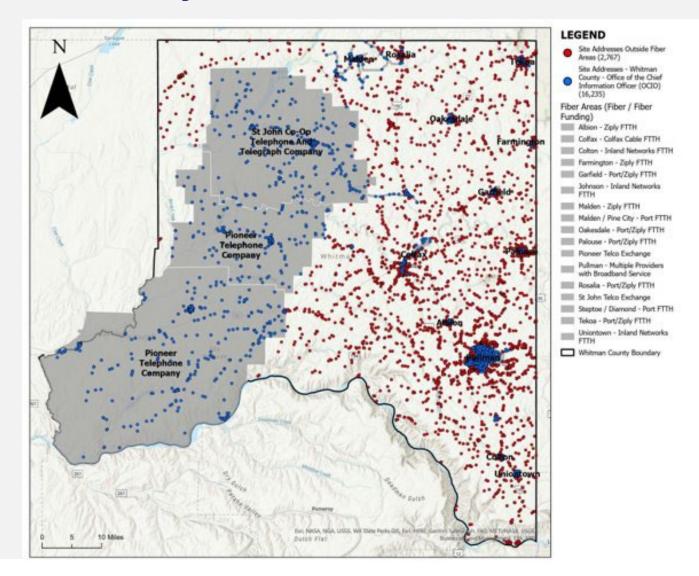
Port of Whitman County

- \$42B for high-speed Internet access
- Funded by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL)
- Each state's BEAD funding allocation is based on their percentage of "unserved" households (25/3Mbps) as determined by the FCC National Broadband Map
- Washington received the 10th largest allocation (~\$1.23B)
- ~1.64 Billion total investment with matches
- ~\$40 Million per county in WA
